EPISTLE: Ephesians 4:1-6

Brethren: I plead with you, then, as a prisoner for the Lord, to live a life worthy of the calling you have received, with perfect humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another lovingly. Make every effort to preserve the unity which has the Spirit as its origin and peace as its binding force. There is but one body ad one Spirit, just as there is but one hope given all of you by your call. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all, and works through all, and is in all.

In this section of his letter written to the Christian community at Ephesus, the Holy Apostle Paul asserts that Jesus' followers always should be at unity and in harmony with each other because they all have the same Father – God the Father in heaven. They therefore must accept life and its various consequences with humility and patience, making allowances for the faults of one's neighbors. It is precisely when we can exhibit this type of understanding and show such practical sympathy towards others that we indeed do demonstrate true Christian charity, which translates into love and concern for our neighbor. Paul tells the Ephesians to be at one with God first, and then inevitably they will be at peace, harmony, and unity with each other. True-believing Christian people belong to one body – the Body of Jesus Christ (which is the Church) – and there is but one Spirit that animates and vivifies this Body: the Holy Spirit.

GOSPEL: Luke 10: 25-37

There was a scholar of the law* who stood up to test him and said, "Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus said to him, "What is written in the law? How do you read it?" He said in reply, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." He replied to him, "You have answered correctly; do this and you will live." But because he wished to justify himself, he said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man fell victim to robbers as he went down from Jerusalem to Jericho. They stripped and beat him and went off leaving him half-dead. A priest happened to be going down that road, but when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side. Likewise, a Levite came to the place, and when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side. But a Samaritan traveler who came upon him was moved with compassion at the sight. He approached the victim, poured oil and wine over his wounds and bandaged them. Then he lifted him up on his own animal, took him to an inn and cared for him. The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper with the instruction, 'Take care of him. If you spend more than what I have given you, I shall repay you on my way back.' Which of these three, in your opinion, was neighbor to the robbers' victim?" He answered, "The one who treated him with mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."
